Key Challenges facing the Industry – Health and Safety

- Maintaining/Improving the Industry's Injury Incidence Rate (IIR)
- Maintaining high standards and consistency of approach across the sector
- Ensuring the available workforce are competent
- Working with other industry bodies and HSE
- Raising the profile and control of 'Health' issues Dust/Silica
- Reviewing and implementing Regulatory changes CDM Regulations





Proposed changes to the CDM Regulations (2015?)

- In 2011 the HSE Board considered that a significant change to the CDM Regulations was required
- Regulations were to be more closely aligned with the original Directive issued by the EU in 1992
- Consultation Document was issued in March 2014 and lasted for 10 weeks





Proposed changes to the CDM Regulations (2015?)

- Main Proposed Changes:
 - Removal of the Approved Code of Practice
 - Revising the requirements for reviewing Competency
 - Replacement of the CDM Coordinators role
 - Domestic Client Exemption
 - Notification of Projects





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
