The scenarios show the broad mechanisms through which a residential development could achieve biodiversity net gain under the policy proposals.

The same principles could apply for wider development and construction.

SCENARIO A

The developer is able to avoid harm, mitigate and enhance on site.



SCENARIO B

The developer is unable to avoid, mitigate and compensate all impacts on site, but is able to secure local compensatory habitat creation.



SCENARIO C

The developer is unable to avoid, miligate and compensate on site, and unable to find local compensatory habitat to invest in. The tariff is therefore used to fund cost-effective habitat creation projects according to local and national conservation and natural capital priorities.








Introducing the ten characteristics

- Identity attractive and distinctive.
- Built form a coherent pattern of development.
- Movement accessible and easy to move around.
- Nature enhanced and optimised.
- Public spaces safe, social and inclusive.
- Uses mixed and integrated.
- Homes and buildings functional, healthy and sustainable.
- Resources efficient and resilient.
- Lifespan made to last.




