












Local plan targets at 220k vs delivery at 229k vs standard method at 295k







A lack of effective strategic planning holding back economic growth potential by £78bn in OxCam Arc alone











Worsening land supply and falling permissions...








The government has written to 17 councils threatening to strip them of their planning powers because of their poor performance in determining applications on time.



Draft NPPF reforms of December 2022 set the standard for major fall in house building

Unmet housing need diluted in duty to cooperate; Green Belt review voluntary; higher density threatened by character provisions; offset past 'over-delivery'; five year land supply and delivery test weakened

Proposed NPPF policy revisions on local plans and housing land will result in c.77k fewer new homes per year, dropping to just half the Government's 300k ambition, even before accounting for homes held back by water and nutrient restrictions. By 2030, this means over a million fewer homes than the national target

Ministers Join backbench Tories in backlash as report suggests new homes in England may fall by third




The fall in housebuilding may cost the economy £34 billion and mean the loss of 386,000 jobs







The LURB will re-wire substantial parts of the planning system from Autumn 2024






Decisions on planning applications and appeals to be made in line with the development plan and National Development Management Policies, unless material considerations strongly indicate otherwise










No immediate escape from the vortex but an exit route could be emerging

- 1. System feels at its lowest ebb in modern times
- 2. A state of suspended animation until at least autumn 2024 (more likely 2025)
- 3. A re-wired and digitalised system could make the front end and mechanics of planning feel quite different
- 4. Policy picture unclear:
 - Current NPPF may be in play longer than we expected in December
 - A fundamental re-write of the NPPF and new standard method
 - Scheduled pre-election but realistic?
 - General election could herald further policy shift through to 2025
